
Hello DCFD Team members...



Interesting stats to share - Last month our communication center answered 13,180 calls and made 7,145 outgoing calls. We entered 13,149 calls for service into our CAD system. This is covering all disciplines that we dispatch. Our employees stepped up to the plate yet again. 11 full time employees and 3 part time employees went above and beyond their normal obligations to work a collective total of 470 hours of overtime to cover shift shortages. We are thankful and proud of our employees!



As many of you know, on Thursday, June 24th, 2021, at around 1:25 a.m. EDT, Champion Towers South, a 12 story beachfront condominium in the Miami Suburbs of Surfside, FL, partially collapsed. A total of 98 deaths. Six days after the building collapsed, Pichs got a direct call from the Miami-Dade Deputy Fire Chief Gregory Rubin asking if he could return to the area to assist in the search and recovery effort. September 20th and 21st marked the 12th anniversary of the historical flood that caused major damage to Douglas County and more importantly seven deaths. As we remember this tragedy, we want to make sure we as a community become more resilient. The terms 100- and 500-year flood can be misleading. You can have multiple events that can be categorized as 100- and 500-year floods in a short time. As many of our citizens that lost their homes in this event did not have flood insurance, we wanted to use information provided by FEMA to encourage citizens to purchase flood insurance. Many of the homes destroyed in 2009 were not in a designated flood zone.

Disaster Assistance vs. Flood Insurance: Do You Know the Difference?

If you experience property damage during a flood, you'll likely be able to cover your recovery costs through disaster assistance funding—right? Possibly wrong. In fact, federal disaster assistance isn't guaranteed, and many residents overestimate the amount of funding they'll receive (if any). As climate change worsens and residents face an increasing risk of damage from things like hurricanes, levee failures, and post-fire flooding, you'll want to make sure you're prepared. Take the first step by visiting [Floodsmart.gov](https://www.floodsmart.gov) to learn how flood insurance can best protect you against the financial impact of flooding.

Here are five key differences between disaster assistance and flood insurance:

1. **Disaster Declarations:** Federal disaster assistance requires a Major Disaster Declaration from the president to authorize funding. Flood insurance does not require a disaster declaration, so policyholders can make a claim almost immediately after any flood event.
2. **Coverage:** Both disaster assistance and flood insurance cover flood damage to your primary residence—but disaster assistance is only designed to make a home safe and fit to occupy, not to restore it to pre-disaster condition. Disaster assistance can sometimes be used for additional expenses like vehicle repairs, temporary housing, or medical fees, but only flood insurance offers building and contents coverage that is customizable to meet your needs.
3. **Payout:** Federal disaster assistance often comes in the form of a FEMA disaster grant, which averages about \$5,000 per household, or a Small Business loan from the Small Business Authority. (SBA) By comparison, the average flood insurance claim payment over the past five years was approximately \$69,000. Unless purchased through a private vendor, flood insurance policies are backed by the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). You will never need to repay the NFIP for your flood insurance, but certain forms of federal assistance, like SBA loans, must be repaid with interest.

We have also taken delivery of a 2021 Sutphen Monarch Pumper (Engine # 5). The Apparatus Committee (Chief Jolivette, Chief Phillips, Capt. Zachmeyer and Doug Turner) returned from Appleton, Wisconsin on 10.23.21 with great news of additional apparatus to update the Department's Fleet. (1) Ladder Truck: November 2021, (2) Pumpers: December 2021 and January 2022. These new additions to the department will continue to enhance and protect the quality of life within our service area through education, prevention and emergency response. This is aligned directly with the Department's Strategic Goal # 6 (Prepare for area growth through a standard of cover strategy to improve operational performance).
